he Milwaukee Partnership Academy invited teachers to become an Action Research Fellow, sponsored by the NEA Foundation and MetLife Foundation. Teachers will be selected to join a nationwide teacher network. We are seeking teachers who would like to take an active role in influencing policy in the following areas:

- Teacher Leadership in School Change
- Teacher Preparation and New Teacher Induction
- Ongoing Professional Growth
- Teacher Networks

Action Research Fellows' work will center on closing achievement gaps to improve student achievement, conducting action research in their classrooms and schools, engaging the public and elected officials in community conversations about public education, and publishing and disseminating findings and recommendations nationwide.

Teachers selected to become MPA Action Research Fellows will:

- Increase knowledge of major challenges facing the teaching profession by taking part in discussions with experts based on readings
- Improve leadership skills
- Be recognized by the public and the media
- Represent teachers nationwide as spokesperson for policy issues
- Participate in action research
- Be awarded a \$1,000 stipend
- Become members of an online community

We seek diverse groups of teacher leaders who are active in school communities and have track records in improving schools. Fellows will conduct much of their work online.

The 15 MPA Action Research Fellows will be announced at the March 17th meeting of the MPA Partners.

Milwaukee Shakespeare, the professional theatre that produces three Shakespeare plays each season, provides MPS students and staff with a great opportunity. NEA Family Involvement Grants — Congratulations!

The schools receiving NEA Family Involvement grants are incorporating monthly family lunch projects, literature response journals, writing workshops, literacy nights, storytelling and book clubs into their programs. The following is a brief summary of these grants.

Garland Elementary School — The goal is to increase the number of proficient Science Fair Projects from 65 to 75 and increase parental attendance by 5% at the following activities:

- 1. WKCE Test Information night
- 4. Science Night
- 2. Science Fair Prep Night
- 5. Literacy Night

3. Math Night

Twenty-first Street School — Students will be given a pre/post test on basic concepts. Parents will read weekly to their children and help with a weekly project. Parents will be given a survey at the end of the 16 weeks to assess effectiveness of the program.

"The MPA functions as a vehicle promoting the direct goal of all Milwaukee schools, namely, to ensure success in student learning and achievement. Indirectly, bringing resources and focus to strengthen the skills and knowledge-base of teachers and staff, to increase the capacity of each teacher and the collective capacity of each school, the MPA helps build the foundation grounding student success. I am grateful that the private colleges and universities who train many of our

Milwaukee and MPS faculty now have an opportunity to be included in the dialogue and work of the Academy at the Executive Partners level, having been involved for a number of years at the operational level."

Fifty-third Street School — Kindergarten children will read *Pete's a Pizza* and then discuss and illustrate the story. Parents will be invited to participate in an after-school activity revolving around the story using literacy strategies and math strategies. They will then participate as a family in a Pizza Night.

Lloyd Street School — A book club will be established for parents and the school will update its Family Resource Center. Books for parents to read to their children and literacy rich activities will be provided.

Maple Tree Elementary School — A monthly family lunch project in second grade classrooms will be established. Lunches will be student designed and prepared. Each lunch theme will be completed by the child and their guest and will include a giveaway book, math manipulative or game or scientific tool for the family to remember.

Hampton Elementary School — One Grade 5 class will ask parents to chaperone on field trips that inspire writing and volunteer to participate in writing workshops. The parents will help children co-author an original story. The books will be bound and ready for publishing. The parents and children will read their books to other classrooms at the school.

La Escuela Fratney — Two Family Literacy Nights with storytelling, hands-on projects and book making will be established in conjunction with literacy circles for parents.

Hi-Mount Boulevard Elementary School — Three learning sessions for parents will be held. One will be on Webgrader (online software which parents can access from home or the library to monitor students' progress) and two sessions will update parents on middle school issues (bullying, competition, learning styles...)

Wisconsin Conservatory of Lifelong Learning — Literature response journals will be developed for fifth grade students and their parents. Parents and children will read a book and then keep a written journal of their thoughts and reactions to the literature. A Parent Workshop will introduce the idea, weekly writings will occur and an end-of-the-year celebration will be held.

Fritsche Middle School — A Saturday morning conference will be held for parents, teachers and students in Team G of the school. Parents of low achieving students will meet one on one with the team teachers. Bus passes for parents will be provided.
